





UPGRADING THE ARENA COMPLEX IN DOWNTOWN ST. PAUL



CHAIR'S REPORT

Dear BOMA Members.

I want to give everyone a brief overview of the proposal to renovate the Xcel Energy Center Complex that many of you have been hearing and reading about. The renovation project includes the Xcel Energy Center, Roy Wilkins Auditorium and Saint Paul RiverCentre.

The Xcel Energy Center, in its 25th year, along with the adjoining 27-year-old Saint Paul RiverCentre and the 93-year-old Roy Wilkins

Auditorium, all require significant upgrades in both infrastructure and equipment. Renovations to the city-owned Arena Complex are estimated to cost \$769 million. The city is asking the state to fund approximately half of the cost, with the Minnesota Wild funding 30%, and the city and local partners providing the remaining 20%.

Annually, the Arena Complex attracts over 2 million visitors, and with the renovation, is estimated to increase annual local spending from \$383 million to \$493 million. The project would also create approximately 2,300 union construction jobs, and, when complete, will employ more than 5,000 people in Saint Paul.

The first phase of construction could begin as early as 2026. For more information, you can visit the City's microsite at stpaul.gov/arena.

Peritalizing St. Paul:

Last week Governor Walz <u>announced an order to require state employees to return to the office</u> at least half of the time beginning June 1, with an exception for those who live 75 or more miles away.

The Governor cited collaboration and better mentorship opportunities for newer staff, along with aligning what was already happening within the private sector as the reason for the order. <u>Given the blowback by labor unions</u>, it is possible he could step back from this decision.

I encourage those who are Saint Paul residents to engage their legislators to illustrate the importance of what potentially thousands of people could mean to vitality and success of the capital city.

Economic Boost for Local Businesses - More workers downtown means increased foot traffic for restaurants, coffee shops, retail stores, and service businesses. Many small businesses rely on office workers for their lunch rush and after-work crowds, and their return will help stabilize and grow these establishments.

Increased Safety & Activity - A busier downtown naturally leads to a greater sense of security. More people on the streets create a safer environment due to increased visibility and informal social monitoring. Additionally, a more active downtown discourages crime and makes the area more welcoming for residents and visitors.

Public Transit & Infrastructure Utilization - Many state employees use public transportation, so their return will boost transit ridership, potentially leading to improved services. Parking ramps, skyways, and public spaces will also see more use, justifying investments in maintenance and enhancements.

Stronger Community & Cultural Engagement - A thriving workforce downtown encourages more afterhours activity, from happy hours to cultural events. Employees may stay downtown for concerts, theater performances, and sports events, contributing to the city's entertainment scene.

Increased Real Estate Demand - More people downtown can lead to a revitalization of commercial real estate, helping to fill vacant office spaces and spurring interest in urban living. This not only helps our commercial real estate industry but could lead to further development of housing, parks, and amenities, making Saint Paul a more attractive place to live and work.

The return of state employees to our capital city would help restore energy to downtown Saint Paul, reinforcing it as a lively, safe, and economically resilient city. If you are unsure of who to contact, visit the **Who Represents Me?** tool here.

Mid-Session Update

The latest <u>budget forecast</u> from the Office of Management and Budget marks the beginning of the next step of the biennial budget-setting process. Minnesota operates on a two-year budget cycle.

How hard will it be to set the budget in two months? Of the past 5 budget setting cycles, 4 of them required a special session to complete. The only budget completed on time was in 2023 when the DFL party held a trifecta of power: House, Senate, and Governor's Office.

For 2024-2025, the state budget was nearly \$70 billion. The 2026-2027 planning estimate is \$66 billion, covering the two-year period starting July 1, 2025. After adjusting for inflation and one-time funding, the forecast shows a slight surplus of \$456 million for the next two years. However, beyond 2027, the outlook is much more concerning. As of February, the state projects a \$6 billion deficit on a \$71 billion budget for fiscal years 2027-2028.

The original <u>Governor's Budget</u> is now out of balance following the latest forecast. Over the next two weeks, his administration will announce his 2025 Supplemental Budget Recommendations to address this shortfall and possibly shift certain priorities.

The Rest of Session

The legislature will begin preparing a budget with the deadline for its last stops in House and Senate on April 11th.

Beginning the evening of the 11th the legislature recesses on Easter/Passover break and returns on April 22. They will then pass budget the bills from each body and go to conference committee to work out the differences between the House and Senate.

By May 19th, the House and Senate must reach an agreement on the budget and send it to the Governor for approval. If they miss this deadline, the Governor can call a special session to force its completion.

The next critical deadline is June 30th. Minnesota must have a two year a budget in place by July 1st, 2025. The constitution mandates a balanced budget, deficit spending is not allowed. Without a signed budget by July 1st, parts of state government will begin to shut down.

The Memorial Weekend will include a Candlelight Service on Saturday, May 3, 2025, followed by the Memorial Service on May 4, 2025. Helping to enlist your buildings to light up in red on May 3, 2025, or any time between April 27 and May 4, 2025, would add to this extraordinary display of respect for our fallen heroes and support for their surviving families from your state and across the nation.

Q: What are some of the highlights of your membership?


A: I really enjoy the monthly luncheons! It's a way to stay connected with all the members. The quest speakers are always interesting while educating us on our city and community.
